A Chaplain's View

I started as a Chaplain back in April this year. I hadn't really intended being a Town Centre Chaplain. I'd had one previous experience of chaplaincy (hospital)—and pretty much felt like a fish-out-of-water for the whole time. Chaplaincy feels outside my comfort zone. It's not really my 'thing'. So I was all ready to say 'no' to the person who had asked whether I would consider being a chaplain. Except... I happened to be thinking about this when driving in my car one night, listening to a track on a Christian CD. I have no idea which track it was. All I know is, at that precise moment, I heard lyrics that were along the lines of: if you don't tell them, how are they going to hear? Good point. It felt like a 'nudge' from God. So I said 'yes'. I ended up on the top level of Festival Place, with my 'patch' being from the slope by Laura Ashley, up to the top, and everything between Debenhams and what will be the new Next.

For me, Challenge Number One of being a Chaplain is simply remembering people's names. There are twenty-five units that I visit, usually spending one morning a week on the patch. I've spoken to well over 150 different staff members in that time. Some I may see only once or twice—maybe they don't usually work on the days that I tend to go in, or usually work on a different shift, or only stay for a short length of time. Shops may have a large number of members of staff, only a handful of whom are

full-time. There are probably around 60 people I see on a regular basis (though that may be once a week or once a month). For me, trying to remember their names and details of their lives that they have shared with me is a challenge! Relationships, for me, grow out of those remembered details and remembered names.

Challenge Number Two is to remain prayerful and open to God's Spirit as I go around. Which member of staff should I speak to today? How can I show care for them and take an interest in them? Is what they're telling me something that I can offer to pray for? For much of the time for me, being a Chaplain is about being a friendly face, and being a regular presence. And it is out of those things that opportunities arise from time to time, often out of the blue, to talk about spiritual matters, to share about Jesus, to offer to pray, or to actually pray with someone, then and there. And that is a huge privilege and joy.

Not that it's always easy. There is sometimes a feeling of being deliberately avoided - but that is quite rare. But the Chaplain's uniform gives us a right to be there and an identity that is the starting point for initial conversations. The rest is by the grace of God!
